


How to read a chord chart

A chord chart is a picture of the guitar neck as viewed from the front.

- The symbol above the chord chart identify the name and quality of the chord.
- The string at the far right is the high e string (thinnest one).
- The string at the far left is the low e string (thickest one).
- Each horizontal line represents a fret.
- The location of the circle identifies which string and fret to put fingers.
- The numbers inside the circle indicates which fingers should be used on those notes.
- A circle at the zero fret signifies that the string should be played open.
- An X at the zero fret signifies that the string should not be played.



1. D dominant 7 chord
2. The third finger is on the 2nd fret of the high e string
3. The first finger is on the 1st fret of the b string
4. The second finger is on the 2nd fret of the g string
5. the d string is played open
6. both the a and the low e string are not played
